

Companion Plant: Mayapple



Podopyllum peltatum, Mayapple, is native across much of the United States. It's in the same plant family as barberry!. It's typically included in the garden for it's large, showy foliage that hides it's delicate white to pink flowers that appear in March to April in Tennessee. It will form a dense mat. Leaves can reach 6 to 8 inches across and stand as tall as 18 inches. Will spread by rhizomes, so best for the back of the garden or edge of a woodland stand.

And, Speaking of Pests...

Ambrosia beetle is being reported on Facebook gardening groups. While it's good to alert fellow gardeners about finding damage from different insect pests, it is also good to alert the Tennessee Department of Agriculture. It can easily be done on-line at <u>https://stateoftennessee.formstack.</u> com/forms/report_a_pest or you can contact your county extension office. Don't know the number, you can look it up here https://utextension.tennessee.edu/officelocations-departments-centers/. By clicking on your county's name in the list, you will be directed to your county's extension webpage. Scroll down to the bottom to find their address and phone number.

Why is it important to report pests to the TN Department of Agriculture? They can send inspectors to a commercial operation that you report having seen an insect or a disease pest. Think about that HVX infected hosta you saw at a garden center - local or big box store. If you report seeing it, the TDA inspectors can inspect the facility and then educate the managers about the problem and get them to stop selling. If the plants were purchased from a wholesale producer, they can then track down that producer and have them stop selling the infected/infested plants. You become part of the solution and help protect everyone.

Why talk to your local Extension agent? Extension agents will work with the TN Department of Agriculture if something is reported to their office. Additionally, the agents can then start to educate others in the county about the issue and help make sure other producers don't experience the same pest problem. On the Protect TN Forests website, part of the TN Department of Agriculture, you can find an <u>Emerging Threats page</u>. At the moment, they report six emerging threats to Tennessee forests:

- * Sudden Oak Death
- Spotted Lanternfly
- * Oak Wilt
- * Asian Longhorned Beetls
- * Gold spotted Oak Borer
- * Cogongrass

On their <u>Insects page</u>, they provide information on 14 other major insect problems affecting trees in our state, including an assortment of other beetles, emerald ash borer, hemlock woolly adelgid, spongy moth, woodwasp, pine sawflies, tent caterpillar, gall-forming insects, crape myrtle scale, hackberry aphid, and tent caterpillar. They also have pages devoted to diseases and invasive plants.

There's also good information about plant pests and quarantines on the general Department of Agriculture <u>Plants page</u>. Many of the same insects are included, however, not all are the same as on the Protect TN Forests information. It's worth it to check both sites to learn about pests in the state. Insects don't distinguish between forests and home landscapes.

April/May in the Zone 7b Garden

- Plant annuals and perennials.
 - Can transplant perennials since ground is warming and roots will more quickly establish. Make sure they are wellwatered.
- Delay planting warm season annuals until early to mid-May. While in Zone 7b now, there is still a chance for a light frost, especially at higher elevations.
 - Caladiums
 - Cannas
 - Elephant ears
 - Vinca or Periwinkle (Catharanthus roseus)
 - Cockscomb (Celosia)
 - Lantana
 - Pentas
 - Petunias
 - Zinnias
- Based on soil test, it's a good time to fertilize azaleas, other spring flowering shrubs, and perennials. Read specific product labels for directions.
 - Hollytone
 - MiracleGro All Purpose Plant Food
 - Miracid for Acid-loving Plants
 - MiracleGro Performance Organics
 - Ironite
 - Milorganite
- Keep an eye out for rabbits, squirrels, chipmunks, and deer. They are very active. Having natural predators such as coyote, fox, dogs and cats is the best control; some people don't like predators. People report various degrees of success with different repellents.
 - Repels All (granules or spray)
 - Liquid Fence (spray)
 - Fox and/or Coyote Urine pellets
 - Milorganite
